VE Day Recipe



A British classic – a super light and fluffy sponge, with fresh cream, fresh berries and light buttercream.

30 mins to cook. Prep time 1 hour Serves 12

Ingredients

200g margarine or butter 200g caster sugar 3 medium eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla essence 2 tablespoon milk 200g self raising flour 300g icing sugar 1/2teaspoon vanilla essence 200ml double cream (or Elmlea) Fresh berries, to decorate

Method

Start by pre-heating the oven to 150°C - a low oven temperature for this recipe will ensure an even rise on your bake and a light colour. Line a large rectangular baking tray with foil or baking parchment (you can use 2 round tins instead).

Measure your margarine or butter in a large bowl and whisk until lighter in colour and fluffier in texture. Add the caster sugar and cream together.

Whisk your eggs in a separate large bowl until light and bubbly.

Add the eggs to your butter and sugar mixture. Add the vanilla and milk, then mix on a high speed until

you have a thin cake batter. If your mixture seems to have separated at this point, not to worry, its completely normal and will come together once your flour has been added.

Pour in the flour and mix a final time until you have a beautiful, light cake batter ready to bake.

Spoon onto your lined baking tray and spread out right to the edges, you can drop the tray onto your work surface a few times to release any air bubbles in the mixture. Bake in the middle of the oven for approximately 30 minutes, or until a cake tester comes out clean.

Once golden brown, remove from the oven and cool on a wire rack.

To make your buttercream filling, whisk the 150g butter (soften first) until light in colour, then add the icing sugar and vanilla essence and mix until creamy. The buttercream should be soft and spreadable.

For the topping, pour your double cream into a large bowl, and whisk using a hand mixer or stand mixer until the cream forms soft peaks and can be spooned onto your cake without running over the edges. This will take a good few minutes if you are whisking by hand.

Cut your rectangle sponge in half, creating two smaller cakes. Then spread the buttercream on top of one cake, spreading it out right to the edges. Place the second cake on top of the buttercream and press down gently, securing in place.

Top the second layer with fresh cream, then score, to help you arrange your berries in a Union Jack shape, as shown in the photo.

Now simply slice, serve and enjoy! If you are not eating your cake straight away, then store in the fridge.

Well done to **Erin C**, who has been delivering newspapers and essential items to vulnerable members of her local community.

FREDDIE'S FANTASTIC FOOD

Freddie B and his older brother in Millfield, Harry, have helped their family set up a food delivery service that provides fresh fruit and vegetables to key workers and vulnerable self-isolators.

The boys have helped to deliver almost 400 'Somerset Hampers', which contain fresh produce including fresh fruit, vegetables, dairy and meat boxes, to Wells, Shepton, Glastonbury, Somerton, Bristol, Bath and Street. The profits of the service will be donated to Somerset Partnership NHS.

The boys came up with the idea after they thought it was strange that fresh fruit and vegetables were out of stock in supermarkets, and wondered how older people would get the food they needed.

As well as providing a useful service, the boys have learned what it takes to run a small business: Harry has worked on marketing by taking photographs, adding descriptions to the website, monitoring orders and has created social media adverts which have reached 78,000 people. Freddie has learned about customer interaction, logistics and co-ordination, and has particularly enjoyed manning the live chat on the website, where he has had to answer a variety of questions.

HOLLIE'S DONATION BOXES




