During their Computing & ICT lessons, over the last two weeks our Year 7 pupils have been taking part in the national Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge.

What is the Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge?

Bebras is an international initiative aiming to promote Informatics (Computer Science) and computational thinking among school pupils of all ages. The challenges are made up of a set of short problems called Bebras tasks and are delivered online. The tasks are fun, engaging and based on problems that Computer Scientists often meet and enjoy solving. The tasks are solved without prior knowledge, but instead require logical thinking.

What is Computational Thinking?

Computational thinking allows us to take a complex problem, understand what the problem is and develop possible solutions. We can then present these solutions in a way that a computer, a human, or both, can understand.

The four cornerstones of computational thinking:

- Decomposition breaking down a complex problem or system into smaller, more manageable parts
- Pattern recognition looking for similarities among and within problems
- Abstraction focusing on the important information only, ignoring irrelevant detail
- Algorithms developing a step-by-step solution to the problem, or the rules to follow to solve the problem

Each cornerstone is as important as the others. They are like legs on a table if one leg is missing, the table will probably collapse. Correctly applying all four techniques will help when programming a computer.

Even though some of the challenges were pretty difficult, our pupils thoroughly enjoyed having a go at solving them and we eagerly await the results, which should be with us next week.

CHAPLAIN'S THOUGHT OF THE WEEK

The Christmas adverts have arrived. You may have noticed (it has been quite hard not to) that the adverts on TV have become very Christmas focussed. If you've not noticed on TV, then social media has lit-up with reactions to them, suggesting that one, for a fast-food outlet, is so emotive that it shouldn't be watched and another prompting comment as it shows Father Christmas having to prove he is vaccinated and ok to travel! 

It was fantastic to see a number of pupils performing that have been inspired by the Year 4 orchestra project, both this year and last – some of them have only been learning an instrument since September. The pupils can be incredibly proud of everything they have achieved throughout this challenging period and with the amount of talent on display I'm sure they could all go on to achieve great things in music! Millfield had the territory and were creating openings without being able to find that killer goal. With little time to recover, the girls were thrust into the ½ final against Kings College. This game, again, was tightly contested, going to extra time and then to penalty strokes.
